**Draft Minutes for May 6 meeting: Attendance:** Diane Suchomel / At Large, Ray Moore / At Large, Cheri Paavola / At Large, Al Hintz / At Large, Tom Majcen / Columbine Knolls S/E.  
 The meeting started at 6:02 p.m.  
**Diane Suchomel, Vice President**, welcomed everyone.  
 No one from **Jefferson County Sheriff's Department, Jefferson County Public Schools or Foothills Parks and Recreation District** was present. Foothills is still having issues with their website.  
 We had no speaker.  
 We do not have a President.  
 Roll Call was taken. We had 5 members present and did not have a quorum.  
**Ray Moore, Treasurer**, said that we have \$706.54 .  
**Cheri Paavola, Secretary**, was present. The April minutes were not approved.  
**Diane Suchomel, Vice President**, was present.  
**Jefferson County and Planning & Zoning Information:** 26-109438 AR is for West End Ridge subdivision. It is the former church location on W. Coal Mine Ave. It is a couple blocks east of S. Kipling Pkwy. The construction plan review found that it was missing details/specifications for wall #5 (wall around the cell tower).  
 26-110833 FW is for fireworks stand applications. It is the usual undeveloped lot near NE corner of S Kipling Pkwy/W Coal Mine Ave.  
 26-108510 PA is for 17000 W Belleview Ave. It is proposed Mountain Village Development in Willow Springs area. They want to rezone from A-2 and C-1 to PUD for 143 dwelling units. It is 84.71 Acres with private internal roads. Bill Swalling is the developer.  
 26-110401 RDP is for 11262 W. Patterson Pl.  
 26-110469 RDP is for 7362 W. Evans Pl.  
 26-109576 SE is for 6100 S Devinney Way (Foothills Bible church). Firearms discharge training on 6/6 at 8-noon and 1-5 pm. They are expecting 26 people.  
 26-109733 SD is for 7950 Shaffer Pkwy. They plan to install solar.  
 26-110298 SD is for 10512 W Toller Dr. It is for a minor amendment for 64,000 sq. ft. industrial building, office, light assembly, manufacturing and warehouse (in the business park area).

**Other:** Diane attended the School board district 5 representative's town hall meeting at Chatfield HS. The school board discussed three options asking for \$s on the November ballot. School board will vote in August on which option, if any, they want on the November ballot.

Some of the other information from this townhall meeting: School enrollment numbers have declined over the years resulting in some school closures and some other changes have been made, or will be made, as a result of declining enrollment. Ex. Chatfield H.S. is down in enrollment by 3 - 8%. Consequently, they will be losing 4 teacher positions next year. (Some of which are part-time positions.)

Diane attended the townhall meeting at Columbine library on 4/18. State Rep. Lieder and State Senator Cutter held the meeting. State Rep. Lieder spoke about HB 26-1286. It is an automated driving system for commercial motor vehicle.. A truckers union rep. spoke in support of it. There were 2 Jeffco Co. Commissioners, some other elected officials, and political candidate.

HB26-1255 is concerning internet rules. The websites have to respond to enquiries. It has move to the Senate. *(update: The amended bill was passed by the State Legislature and is awaiting a decision by the Governor.)*

Diane attended the 4/28 FHPRD board meeting. Jeffco Open space has asked some FHPRD staff to be on the group making decisions about Fairgrounds and Fehringer Ranch. (3 staff members will participate and 3 board members volunteered to be on it. Probably only 2 board members will attend each meeting.) Portrayals of Native American dances and practices will be stopped. They may be thinking about selling the Fairgrounds.

She heard an update from Jovial Concepts at the FHPRD board meeting re: their 2026 plans for their garden near Weaver Hollow Park.

Diane sent an email to P&Z asking when there will be a publicly available map on their website showing the locations of all licensed STR. She also asked if they could change the website so a person can search licensed STR by area of the County (currently you can only see those entries when you search by Entire County). You can search for short-term rentals if you have the address or can search by either the STR or licensed STR category. *(update: The message "The interactive map of current Short-Term Rentals is in progress. Please check back soon." is on the website now.)*

Diane thanked Ray for helping with our Adopt a Highway Spring cleanup. This is our 20th year.

The update on what will happen to the Colorow Elementary school property. There is apparently no interest from any entity at this time. People can check the school district's property disposition web page for property status information.

On Peiffer, there is interest. The County is working on a possible sale of the property to FHPRD.. The school district has rented out the school to a church via their property use application process... currently for 3 hours on Sunday and for the Easter egg hunt. The school district said they've notified the church that the property may be sold this year.

Title IX funds and the DOJ. The DOJ sent the Jeffco School district a letter saying that some of the school district's practices violate Title IX. The Jeffco School District has responded to DOJ stating that they are following State law.

Ghost bikes were discussed. There are County rules that must be followed for ghost bikes and memorial signs.

JMAP needs to be updated to include the 2 newer businesses in the area near the northeastern corner of S Kipling Pkwy/W Coal Mine Ave.

Columbine Library has been reserved for June and July.

Al reported that a BAM internet cover near his house was missing and he had no response from them when he reported it. Diane suggested sending an email to Commissioner Dahlkemper as a safety violation.

**Old Business:** Laurie reported that the Easter

**Administrative Items** Update to be made to LMRPD Policies and Procedures to clarify that charges/expenses that are required by law or are repetitive in nature do not require a vote by the board.

**Treasurer's Report:** Statement 1 – Expansion of Insurance Claim The Treasurer is providing notice that the insurance claim is being expanded to include two additional documented incidents of external interference with District operations. The first involves a written communication distributed to multiple parties – including the District's insurance adjuster – containing inaccurate statements about the District and its Treasurer. The second involves the public distribution of inaccurate statements about District practices that resulted in direct operational harm, including the loss of an established contractor relationship as a result of those communications. The Board will continue to document all incidents as part of the claim record.

Statement 2 – Non-Response from Insurance Carrier The Treasurer also notes that its formal written request to the insurance carrier for all communications between the adjuster and unauthorized third parties has received no response to date. This non-response is itself being documented as part of the claim record.

Statement 3 – Tree Removal Payment to Designs by Sundown The District has to date paid 50% of the contracted amount of \$168,000 to Designs by Sundown for the removal of dead trees and mitigation of dying trees across District parks. This work represents a direct, quantifiable cost to the District resulting from years of deferred tree maintenance and is a component of the insurance claim currently being documented.

Statement 4 – SDA Membership Renewal Required The Treasurer received notice that the District's 2026 SDA membership renewal has not been completed. Current SDA membership is required as a condition of the District's insurance coverage through the Colorado Special Districts Property & Liability Pool. 2026 dues are approximately \$400. Board authorization to pay is requested.

Statement 5 – Cash balance as of today \$366k

**Park Maintenance and Operations** Park Manager Report: Manager continues to guard trees, trim suckers from trees and clean up debris/branches, plans to clean up near Benton bridge. Reported one snow plowing event during March, no further plowing expected this season. Detailed work on playground equipment in Leawood Park. Informed board of need to replace swing set materials and continue replacing playground caps (general maintenance). Swing set components must be replaced every 2-3 years. The board has no record of swing set components ever being replaced.

Informed board that the two lamp posts in Weaver (playground and tennis courts) require repair. Solicited an electrician's bid: cost is approx \$1400 for one with \$700 required up front. The board unanimously approved this expense as general maintenance. Treasurer to pay.

Discussion was held about retrieving water tanks from Creekside Gardens for watering new trees. Jesse suggested a per-mile cost for using his personal truck and also suggested district to work with Designs By Sundown for watering. Mr. Leaf to follow up on watering solutions.

**Capital Projects and Long-Term Planning** Phone/Email System: Vicki applied for a SIPA grant to offset cost of communications system

No new updates regarding Gmail/Tyler

Surveillance Camera: Dome cameras have been purchased and will be placed in Leawood and Weaver Pavilion areas. Jesse to work with park manager to get cameras installed and running.

Jesse provided an update to the board on CHS student behavior in Leawood during school hours. Jesse spoke with the school, which advised that they take no responsibility and have no control over where students go during their lunch break due to open campus policy. Instructed district to call Jeffco sheriff to report any nefarious behavior.

**Grants and Tree Replacement/ Arbor Day Event:** Vicki provided update on effort to apply for grants. Application for a grant to match \$2000 has been submitted. District expects to purchase 20 trees through Colorado Tree Coalition program.

Arbor day event will be held on Saturday, April 18th from 12-2pm. Event to include planting three maple trees near the Weaver playground, activities for children and adults, kick off of tree donation campaign. Refreshments provided.

Vick and Ken to work together to contact Xcel energy and prepare digging site. Board members assigned tasks to support event preparation.

**New Business** The board discussed the appropriate response to a request from a non-resident that a special meeting be held specifically to discuss beavers. The board deemed a special meeting unnecessary due to the facts that beavers have been a topic of discussion in public board meetings for many months, information is readily available on the website, and public participation is welcome and encouraged at our regularly held monthly meetings (2nd Thursday at 6pm at Leawood Elementary).
